**2023 NATIONAL SHOW YOUTH EVENTS**

"All youth participants at the 2023 National Show Youth Events will be required to have completed either a) the age appropriate Youth for the Quality Care of Animals ([yqcaprogram.org](http://yqcaprogram.org)) **OR** b) a similar training program approved by the youth's state 4-H or FFA program that provides quality care training. When registering for the youth events the youth can either input their YQCA Certificate Number (available on the printable certificate that they are provided upon completion of the certification) or a copy of the certificate of completion for their state 4-H/FFA approved training program."

## How to Experience the New Features in NG

Updates and features to your ADGA account inside NG are constantly changing. Here is a glimpse at some new toys inside your account and how to best access them as they relate to Performance Programs.

### DHIR

Milk Records from 2021 have not yet been imported into your account. At some point these will be displayed under the DHIR tab once you select the animal's registration number. What has been updated are the awards from 2021. These will display under the awards tab. If you believe you are missing a \*M award, the best thing you can do is send the doe page from that lactation to the [performanceprograms@adga.org](mailto:performanceprograms@adga.org) email address. These awards CANNOT be edited by ADGA staff at this time, but we can hold your doe page for review once DHIR programming is ready in NG. Other awards such as \*B will be worked out once the award process programming is complete. ADGA staff cannot update these awards until the programming is ready.

### Buck Collections



If you have had a buck collected and want to know if there is a collection on file, there is a collection icon that now displays on the animal detail page when you select the registration number. This icon will not tell you the collection date if multiple collections are on file, but it will tell you if a collection is on file. If you have collected a buck and the collection icon is not visible, then that animal does not have a collection recorded with ADGA yet.

### DNA

In July of 2022 ADGA started to request all DNA orders directly through your ADGA account so the billing and animal name being typed would display in your transaction history. Since October 2022 requests for unregistered kids have been ordered directly through your account with the sex and tattoo listed in your transaction history. Registered animals that have results and have been requested in NG will show the result on the animal details page under the DNA tab. This result feature will soon be available for unregistered kids too (YAY!). DNA results from 2021 and early 2022 will be imported to your account in the coming weeks and all animals that have results will soon be available in the DNA tab. If you are sub-

mitting a DNA request, not all parents will show on the DNA submission forms, you can still use the forms that are sent to you by email. Each day ADGA staff manually checks the parentage order and adds missing parents that are on file at the lab. If you are requesting DNA for unregistered kids, you must list the parents you want compared on the DNA order form. DNA tests are not compared to every animal on file, only the parents that ADGA provides to the lab. If you are trying to get ahead of the future mandatory buck DNA rule and just want your buck to be on file and you are not questioning the parentage, my recommendation is that you order the DNA for that animal once he is registered that way the result can be stored in your account as soon as the test is complete!

### Linear Appraisal

If you applied for LA in 2023 and signed up after 2/1/23 you will not be billed the LA application fee unless we can schedule you on a trip. If you are wondering, go look at your account transactions. If there is no charge for the LA application, then your herd will only be included if there is room on the trip in your area. We are honoring the schedule that is posted on the website and the dates listed do indicate when the earliest possible trip will happen in your area. Those dates do not mean that every herd in the area will be completed by those dates. Every area has more herds than will fit on any single trip. That means multiple Appraisers may be working in your region at different times. As of May 1, 2023, we have sent currently owned lists to all herds that we intend to score through July 2023. If you have not received a currently owned list yet, you are not on the schedule before August 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023. If you have been scheduled for Appraisal your field worksheets that come in the mail will not have any animal over 7 years old or any bucks listed on the worksheet. This has been done in an effort to reduce the number of unnecessary worksheets being mailed. If you have bucks or animals over 7 that are to be appraised, you can simply hand write them on to your worksheet prior to your appraisal date!

Hopefully, LA scores from 2021 and 2022 will be in your account under the Linear tab prior to Convention.

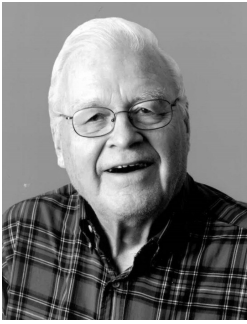

GEORGE HAENLEIN

George Frederick Wilhelm Haenlein died on April 8, 2023. He was professor emeritus, retired 1999, University of Delaware, Department of Animal and Food Sciences, Newark, DE. He was born 1927, Mannheim, Germany. He earned a Dr. Science degree, animal nutrition, University Hohenheim, Germany, 1953; M.S. degree, animal science, University of Delaware, 1960 and Ph.D. dairy science, University of Wisconsin, Madison, 1972. He emigrated to the USA in 1953, worked for 3 years as assistant manager on 650 acre, 120 milking Guernsey, the Zeitler farm, in Delaware and later became a naturalized US citizen.

George joined the faculty of the U of D in 1957. He taught courses in daily cattle production, dairy cattle judging and selection, genetics of farm animals, artificial insemination of dairy cattle, dairy products judging, dairy goat production and behavior of domesticated animals. He did research in dairy cattle and dairy goat nutrition, factors affecting milk composition and polymorphisms of milk proteins on about 3,000 Guernsey and about 3,000 Holstein cows. In addition, he was the supervisor of the U and D dairy herd and was the Delaware State Dairy Extension Specialist in charge of Delaware Dairy Herd Improvement (DHIA) programs. George was an accredited dairy cattle judge with the Maryland Fair Board, an invited judge at many regional dairy cattle and dairy products judging contests, including the National Dairy Goat Show Queretaro, Mexico. In addition, he judged national cheese contests for the American Cheese Society since its beginning from 1983 to 2005, the US Open Cheese Contest in Chicago 2001, and the French National Cheese Contest at St. Maure de Touraine near Tours, France 2000.

George published the first book on Nutrient Requirements of Goat 1981; the first Goat Extension Handbook 1981; Handbook of Milk of Non-bovine Mammals 2006 with Dr. Y.W. Park of Fort Valley State University, Georgia; the comprehensive Book on Milk and Milk Products in Human Nutrition 2013; contributed chapters in 2 books Probiotics in Milk with Dr. Y.W. Park and Goat Science with Dr. S. Solaiman of Tuskegee University, Alabama and founding editor-in-chief of the Small Ruminant Research journal in 1982 and 1992. George reviewed manuscripts for the American Journal of Dairy Science, Small Ruminant Research, International Dairy Science Journal and Encyclopedia of Dairy Science besides more than 150 refereed research papers and several hundred extension papers in trade magazines.

Sponsored by the USDA, he presented papers on topics of dairy cattle production improvement and milk of dairy goats and dairy sheep in human nutrition nationally and internationally at conferences in 17 foreign countries. Sponsored by the US Agency for International Development (USAID), he participated in projects in dairy cattle and dairy goat improvement foreign aid programs in 10 foreign countries.

He received the Distinguished Service Award of the American Dairy Science Association, chaired the Sub-Committee of the National Science Foundation on Nutrient Requirements of Goats, founder and honorary editor-in-chief of the International Small Ruminant Research Journal, charter member of the International Goat Association and the Smithsonian Associates, director of the American Dairy Goat Research Foundation, served as secretary of the Delaware Guernsey Association and established a Dairy Fund Scholarship for Animal & Food Science majors at the University of Delaware.

He and his wife Elizabeth, born Zeitler, married in 1954, had 5 children, 14 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren and reside at the Midland Meadows Senior Living Center, Ona-West Virginia.

## CHAMPION CHALLENGE UPDATE

EFFECTIVE 5/14/23  
MEMBER REPORTED CHAMPION WINS

Important information to know:

Starting 5/14/23 pending champions can become eligible for the Champion Challenge class through the process passed in [Postal Ballot 2223-5](#).

The record must be SUBMITTED ONLINE through the JOT form and the record received via PDF must be PRINTED and presented to the show committee along with the registration or recordation papers to be eligible for the Champion Challenge class.

ADGA has provided an official statement of exception that can be provided to show and fair committees.

There is a list of all show sanctions from 2021-2023 on the ADGA website to help you complete the form to the best of your ability.

## DAIRY GOAT AWARENESS WEEK

June 10–17, 2023

*10 Dairy Goat Awareness Week Promotion Ideas -*

1. Donate dairy goat books or dairy goat publication subscriptions. Some locations that may appreciate these resources could be your local public library, high school Ag class, university libraries or county extension offices. Match the donated publication to the recipient: health books to the local vet, children's books to the local school district or daycare center, a subscription to a dairy goat publication such as the *ADGA News & Events* to the extension office.
2. Contact your Chamber of Commerce about promoting or providing information on local dairy goat herds and the American Dairy Goat Association.
3. Request State-level recognition of Dairy Goat Awareness Week by state governors and/or legislator.
4. Participate in June Dairy Month activities with dairy cattle breeders or independently. Consider a tasting party with products made from goat milk, a poster contest, or a milking competition in town with local "celebrity" participants such as the mayor, radio personalities, or the 4-H or extension agent.
5. Purchase copies of "Own A Dairy Goat" from the American Dairy Goat Association or reprints of articles of general interest from dairy goat publications. Arrange for them to be made available free in libraries, extension offices or high school Ag classes. Ask about publications from the American Dairy Goat Association by calling **828-286-3801** or emailing [support@adga.org](mailto:support@adga.org).
6. Arrange a tour of one or more dairy goat farms for 4-H, FFA, Ag classes or school classes.
7. Arrange a local interview about dairy goats. Write an article about dairy goats and submit it to the editor of your local newspaper. Throughout the year, be sure to recognize local, regional and/or state participants in the dairy goat industry. Check with public radio and TV stations about an interview or a visit to your farm.
8. Have a display at a shopping mall or farmer's market featuring live kids, brochures, and a map of the area with pins on it to locate breeders, with strings from the pins to the address and phone number of each breeder.
9. Take some dairy goats to a 4-H day camp and pass out samples of dairy goat products if possible.
10. Create an information display in a public building or at a local farm supply or hardware store. Include information about the American Dairy Goat Association, state and local dairy goat clubs and local dairy goat breeders.
